


Working on your computer

Safety instructions


Use the following safety guidelines to help protect your computer from potential damage and to help to ensure your personal safety. Unless otherwise noted, each procedure included in this document assumes that the following conditions exist:

- You have read the safety information that shipped with your computer.
- A component can be replaced or--if purchased separately--installed by performing the removal procedure in reverse order.





CAUTION: Many repairs may only be done by a certified service technician. You should only perform troubleshooting and simple repairs as authorized in your product documentation, or as directed by the online or telephone service and support team. Damage due to servicing that is not authorized by Dell is not covered by your warranty. Read and follow the safety instructions that came with the product.



CAUTION: Handle components and cards with care. Do not touch the components or contacts on a card. Hold a card by its edges or by its metal mounting bracket. Hold a component such as a processor by its edges, not by its pins.

CAUTION: When you disconnect a cable, pull on its connector or on its pull-tab, not on the cable itself. Some cables have connectors with locking tabs; if you are disconnecting this type of cable, press in on the locking tabs before you disconnect the cable. As you pull connectors apart, keep them evenly aligned to avoid bending any connector pins. Also, before you connect a cable, ensure that both connectors are correctly oriented and aligned.


Before working inside your computer

To avoid damaging your computer, perform the following steps before you begin working inside the computer.

- **1.** Ensure that you follow the Safety instructions.
- 2. Ensure that your work surface is flat and clean to prevent the computer cover from being scratched.
- **3.** Turn off your computer, see Turning off your computer.

CAUTION: To disconnect a network cable, first unplug the cable from your computer and then unplug the cable from the network device.

- **4.** Disconnect all the network cables from the computer.
- 5. Disconnect your computer and all attached devices from the electrical outlets.
- **6.** Press and hold the power button while the computer is unplugged to ground the system board.
- **7.** Remove the cover.



Turning off your computer

CAUTION: To avoid losing data, save and close all open files and exit all open programs before you turn off your computer.

- **1.** Turning off your computer:
 - In Windows 10 (using a touch enabled device or mouse):
 - 1. Click or tap
 - 2. Click or tap \circlearrowleft and then click or touch **Shut down**.
 - In Windows 8 (using a touch enabled device):
 - 1. Swipe in from the right edge of the screen, opening the **Charms** menu and select **Settings**.
 - 2. Tap \circlearrowleft and then tap **Shut down**
 - In Windows 8 (using a mouse):
 - 1. Point to upper-right corner of the screen and click **Settings**.
 - 2. Click \circlearrowleft and then click **Shut down**.
 - In Windows 7:
 - 1. Click Start.
 - 2. Click **Shut Down**.
- 2. Ensure that the computer and all attached devices are turned off. If your computer and attached devices did not automatically turn off when you shut down your operating system, press and hold the power button for about 6 seconds to turn them off.

After working inside your computer

After you complete any replacement procedure, ensure you connect any external devices, cards, and cables before turning on your computer.

CAUTION: To avoid damage to the computer, use only the battery designed for this particular Dell computer. Do not use batteries designed for other Dell computers.

- **1.** Connect any external devices, such as a port replicator or media base, and replace any cards, such as an ExpressCard.
- 2. Connect any telephone or network cables to your computer.

CAUTION: To connect a network cable, first plug the cable into the network device and then plug it into the computer.

- 3. Replace the battery.
- 4. Replace the base cover.
- 5. Connect your computer and all attached devices to their electrical outlets.
- **6.** Turn on your computer.

Removing and installing components

This section provides detailed information on how to remove or install the components from your computer.

Recommended tools

The procedures in this document require the following tools:

- Small flat blade screwdriver
- Phillips #0 screwdriver
- Phillips #1 screwdriver
- Small plastic scribe

Removing the base cover

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- **2.** To remove the base cover:
 - a. Loosen the screws that secure the base cover to the computer [1].
 - b. Lift the base cover from the edge and remove it from the computer [2, 3].
 - **NOTE:** You may need a plastic scribe to lift the base cover from the edges.




Installing the base cover


- 1. Align the base cover with the screw holders on the computer.
- 2. Press the edges of the cover until it clicks into place.
- **3.** Tighten the screws to secure the base cover to the computer.
- **4.** Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>.

Removing the battery

- NOTE: If your computer supports the 6-cell battery, it will not support a hard drive.
- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the base cover.
- **3.** To remove the battery:
 - a. Disconnect the battery cable from the connector on the system board [1].
 - b. Remove the screws that secure the battery to the computer [2].
 - c. Lift the battery away from the computer [3].



4. Disconnect the cable from the battery.



- **NOTE:** This step is applicable only for a 6-cell battery
- 5. Unroute the cable from the routing channel [1] and remove the cable from the battery [2].
 - **NOTE:** This step is applicable only for a 4-cell battery.




Installing the battery

- NOTE: If your computer supports the 6-cell battery, it will not support a hard drive.
- 1. Connect the battery cable to the connector on the battery.
- **2.** Route the battery cable through the routing channel on the battery.

- **NOTE:** This step is applicable only for a 4-cell battery.
- **3.** Insert the battery into the slot on the computer.
- **4.** Tighten the screws to secure the battery to the computer.
- 5. Connect the battery cable to the connector on the system board.
- 6. Install the base cover.
- 7. Follow the procedure in After working inside your computer.

Removing the hard drive assembly

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. base cover
 - b. battery
- **3.** To remove the hard drive assembly:
 - a. Disconnect the hard drive cable from the connector on the system board [1] .
 - b. Remove the screws that secure the hard drive assembly to the computer [2].
 - c. Lift the hard drive assembly away from the computer [3].




Removing the hard drive from the hard drive bracket

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. base cover
 - b. **battery**
 - c. hard drive assembly
- 3. Pull the hard drive cable to remove it from the connector.



4. Remove the screws that secure the hard drive bracket to the hard drive [1] and lift the hard drive from the hard drive bracket [2].



Installing the hard drive into the hard drive bracket

- 1. Align the screw holders on the hard drive with the screws on the hard drive bracket.
- 2. Insert the hard drive into the hard drive bracket.
- **3.** Tighten the screws to secure the hard drive to the hard drive bracket.
- 4. Install the:
 - a. hard drive assembly
 - b. <u>battery</u>
 - c. base cover

5. Follow the procedure in After working inside your system.

Installing the hard drive assembly


- 1. Insert the hard drive assembly into the slot on the computer.
- 2. Tighten the screws to secure the hard drive assembly to the computer.
- 3. Connect the hard drive cable to the connector on the hard drive and on the system board.
- 4. Install the:
 - a. battery
 - b. base cover
- 5. Follow the procedures in After working inside your system.

Installing the optional M.2 SSD

- 1. Insert the SSD into the connector on the computer.
- 2. Tighten the screw to secure the SSD to the computer.
- 3. Install the:
 - a. battery
 - b. base cover
- 4. Follow the procedure in After working inside your computer.

Removing the optional M.2 Solid State Drive (SSD)

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. base cover
 - b. battery
- **3.** To remove the SSD:
 - a. Remove the screw that secures the SSD to the computer [1].
 - b. Slide and lift the SSD from the computer [2].




Installing the optional PCIe SSD

- 1. Insert the SSD clip into the slot on the computer.
- 2. Tighten the screw to secure the SSD clip to the computer.
- **3.** Insert the SSD into the connector on the computer.
- **4.** Place the SSD bracket over the SSD and tighten the screws to secure it to the computer.
- 5. Install the:
 - a. battery
 - b. base cover
- **6.** Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>.


Removing the optional PCIe SSD

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. base cover
 - b. **battery**
- **3.** To remove the PCle SSD:
 - a. Remove the screws that secure the SSD bracket to the SSD [1].
 - b. Remove the SSD bracket [2].
 - c. Remove the SSD from the computer [3].



Removing the memory module

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. base cover
 - b. **battery**
- 3. Pull the clips securing the memory module until the memory module pops up [1].
- **4.** Remove the memory module from the system board [2].




Installing the memory module

- Insert the memory module into the memory module socket until the clips secure the memory module.
- 2. Install the:
 - a. <u>battery</u>
 - b. base cover
- 3. Follow the procedures in After working inside your computer.

Removing the WLAN card

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. base cover
 - b. battery
- **3.** To remove the WLAN card:
 - a. Remove the screw that secures the metal bracket to the WLAN card [1].
 - b. Remove the metal bracket [2].
 - c. Disconnect the WLAN cables from the connectors on the WLAN card [3].
 - d. Unroute the WLAN cables from the routing channel.
 - e. Remove the WLAN card from the computer [4].




Installing the WLAN card

- 1. Insert the WLAN card into the slot on the computer.
- 2. Route the WLAN cables through the routing channel.
- 3. Connect the WLAN cables to the connectors on the WLAN Card.
- **4.** Place the metal bracket and tighten the screw to secure it to the computer.
- 5. Install the:
 - a. battery
 - b. base cover
- **6.** Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your system</u>.

Removing the WWAN card

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:

- a. base cover
- b. battery
- **3.** To remove the WWAN card:
 - a. Remove the screw that secures the WWAN card [1].
 - b. Disconnect the WWAN cables from the connectors on the WWAN card [2].
 - c. Unroute the WWAN cables from the routing channel.
 - d. Remove the WWAN card from the computer [3].





- 1. Insert the WWAN card into the slot on the computer.
- 2. Route the WWAN cables through the routing channel.
- 3. Connect the WWAN cables to the connectors on the WWAN card.
- 4. Tighten the screw to secure the WWAN card to the computer
- 5. Install the:
 - a. battery
 - b. base cover
- **6.** Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>.

Removing the power connector port

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.

- **3.** To remove the power connector port:
 - a. Remove the screws to release the metal bracket on the power connector port [1].
 - b. Lift the metal bracket from the computer [2].



Removing the keyboard

- **3.** To remove the keyboard trim:
 - a. Disconnect the keyboard cables from the connectors on the system board [1, 2].
 - b. Using a plastic scribe, lift the keyboard trim from the edges to release it from the keyboard [3, 4, 5].



- **4.** To remove the keyboard:
 - a. Remove the screws that secure the keyboard to the computer [1].
 - b. Lift the keyboard and slide it to remove it from computer [2, 3].



Installing the keyboard

- 1. Align the keyboard with the screw holders on the computer.
- 2. Tighten the screws to secure the keyboard to the computer.
- 3. Align the keyboard trim with the tabs on the computer and press it until it clicks into place
- 4. Connect the keyboard cables to the connectors on the system board.
- 5. Install the:
 - a. battery
 - b. base cover
- **6.** Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your system.</u>



- 1. Follow the procedure in Before working inside your computer.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. base cover
 - b. <u>battery</u>

- c. WLAN
- d. WWAN
- **3.** To remove the display hinge brackets:
 - a. Remove the screw that secures the display hinge bracket to the computer [1].
 - b. Remove the display hinge bracket from the computer [2].




- **4.** To disconnect display cable:
 - a. Unroute the WLAN and WWAN cables from the dock frame [1].
 - b. Remove the screw that secures the eDP cable bracket to the computer [2].
 - c. Remove the eDP cable bracket to access the display cable [3].
 - d. Disconnect the eDP cable from the system board [4].



- **5.** To disconnect the display assembly:
 - a. Unroute the display cable from the dock frame [1].

- b. Remove the screws that secure the display assembly [2]
- c. Release the antenna cables and display cable from the routing channel [3].



- 6. To remove the display assembly:
 - a. Remove the screws that secure the display assembly to the computer [1].
 - b. Open the display [2] and lift the display assembly to remove it from the computer [3].



Installing the display assembly

- 1. Place the display assembly to align with the screw holders on the computer.
- 2. Tighten the screws to secure the display assembly to the computer.
- **3.** Route the display cable through the routing channel and route the antenna cables by pushing it through the hole.
- **4.** Connect the antenna cables and display cable to the connectors.
- **5.** Place the display cable bracket over the connector and tighten the screw to secure the display cable to the computer.
- **6.** Place the display hinge bracket and tighten the screw to secure it to the computer.
- 7. Install the:
 - a. WLAN
 - b. WWAN
 - c. <u>battery</u>
 - d. base cover

8. Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>.

Removing the display bezel

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:

- **3.** Using a plastic scribe, release the tabs on the edges to release the display bezel from the display assembly [1, 2].
- 4. Remove the display bezel from the display assembly.





 - b. Lift the display panel and flip the display panel to access the eDP cable [2].
 - c. Peel the adhesive tape [3] to access the eDP cable.
 - d. Disconnect the eDP cable from the connector [4, 5, 6].
 - e. Lift the display panel from the computer.



Installing the display panel

- 1. Connect the eDP cable to the connector and fix the adhesive tape.
- 2. Align the display panel with the screw holders on the display assembly.
- **3.** Tighten the screws to secure the display panel to the display assembly.
- 4. Install the:
 - a. display assembly
 - b. display bezel
 - c. battery
 - d. base cover
- **5.** Follow the procedure in After working inside your system.

Removing the camera

- **1.** Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. base cover
 - b. <u>battery</u>

- **3.** To remove the camera:

- a. Disconnect the camera cable from the connector on the display assembly [1].

 - b. Slide the system board to disengage the connectors from the slots on the back of the computer.
 - c. Lift the system board from the computer [2].

Diagnostics

If you experience a problem with your computer, run the ePSA diagnostics before contacting Dell for technical assistance. The purpose of running diagnostics is to test your computer's hardware without requiring additional equipment or risking data loss. If you are unable to fix the problem yourself, service and support personnel can use the diagnostics results to help you solve the problem.

Enhanced Pre-Boot System Assessment (ePSA) diagnostics

The ePSA diagnostics (also known as system diagnostics) performs a complete check of your hardware. The ePSA is embedded with the BIOS and is launched by the BIOS internally. The embedded system diagnostics provides a set of options for particular devices or device groups allowing you to:

- Run tests automatically or in an interactive mode
- Repeat tests
- · Display or save test results
- Run thorough tests to introduce additional test options to provide extra information about the failed device(s)
- View status messages that inform you if tests are completed successfully
- View error messages that inform you of problems encountered during testing



CAUTION: Use the system diagnostics to test only your computer. Using this program with other computers may cause invalid results or error messages.



NOTE: Some tests for specific devices require user interaction. Always ensure that you are present at the computer terminal when the diagnostic tests are performed.

You can launch the ePSA diagnostics in two ways:

- 1. Power-on the computer.
- 2. As the computer boots, press the F12 key as the Dell logo appears.
- 3. On the boot menu screen, select the **Diagnostics** option.

The device status LEDs are usually located either on the top or left side of the keyboard. They display the storage, battery and wireless devices connectivity and activity. Apart from that they can be useful as a diagnostic tool when there's a possible failure to the system.



NOTE: The position of the power status light may vary depending on the system.

The following table lists how to read the LED codes when possible errors occur.

The blinking patterns will consist of 2 set of numbers being represented by (First Group: Amber blinks, Second Group: White blinks)



steady white light

- First Group: The LED blinks 1 to 9 times followed by a brief pause with LED off at the interval of 1.5 seconds.(This is in Amber color)
- Second Group: The LED blinks 1 to 9 times, that would be then followed by a longer pause before the next cycle starts again at the interval of 1.5 seconds. (This is in White color)

For Example: No Memory detected (2,3), Battery LED blinks two times of amber color followed by a pause, and then blinks three times of white color. The Battery LED will pause for 3 seconds before the next cycle repeat itself again.

If the computer is connected to an electrical outlet, the battery light operates as follows:

Alternately blinking amber light and white light	An unauthenticated or unsupported non-Dell AC adapter is attached to your laptop.
