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Working on your computer

WARNING: Disconnect all power sources before opening the computer cover or panels. After you finish working inside the computer, replace all covers, panels, and screws before connecting to the power source.

CAUTION: Many repairs may only be done by a certified service technician. You should only perform troubleshooting and simple repairs as authorized in your product documentation, or as directed by the online or telephone service and support team. Damage due to servicing that is not authorized by Dell is not covered by your warranty. Read and follow the safety instructions that came with the product.



CAUTION: To avoid electrostatic discharge, ground yourself by using a wrist grounding strap or by periodically touching an unpainted metal surface, such as a connector on the back of the computer.

CAUTION: Handle components and cards with care. Do not touch the components or contacts on a card. Hold a card by its edges or by its metal mounting bracket. Hold a component such as a processor by its edges, not by its pins.

CAUTION: When you disconnect a cable, pull on its connector or on its pull-tab, not on the cable itself. Some cables have connectors with locking tabs; if you are disconnecting this type of cable, press in on the locking tabs before you disconnect the cable. As you pull connectors apart, keep them evenly aligned to avoid bending any connector pins. Also, before you connect a cable, ensure that both connectors are correctly oriented and aligned.

Before working inside your computer

To avoid damaging your computer, perform the following steps before you begin working inside the computer.

- 1. Ensure that you follow the <u>Safety instructions</u>.
- 2. Ensure that your work surface is flat and clean to prevent the computer cover from being scratched.
- **3.** Turn off your computer, see <u>Turning off your computer</u>.

 Δ CAUTION: To disconnect a network cable, first unplug the cable from your computer and then unplug the cable from the network device.

- 4. Disconnect all the network cables from the computer.
- 5. Disconnect your computer and all attached devices from the electrical outlets.
- 6. Press and hold the power button while the computer is unplugged to ground the system board.
- 7. Remove the cover.

CAUTION: Before touching anything inside your computer, ground yourself by touching an unpainted metal surface, such as the metal at the back of the computer. While you work, periodically touch an unpainted metal surface to dissipate static electricity, which could harm internal components.

Turning off your computer

After working inside your computer

After you complete any replacement procedure, ensure you connect any external devices, cards, and cables before turning on your computer.



CAUTION: To avoid damage to the computer, use only the battery designed for this particular Dell computer. Do not use batteries designed for other Dell computers.

- **1.** Connect any external devices, such as a port replicator or media base, and replace any cards, such as an ExpressCard.
- 2. Connect any telephone or network cables to your computer.

Δ CAUTION: To connect a network cable, first plug the cable into the network device and then plug it into the computer.

- **3.** Replace the battery.
- 4. Replace the base cover.
- 5. Connect your computer and all attached devices to their electrical outlets.
- 6. Turn on your computer.

Removing and installing components

- Small plastic scribe

Removing the back cover

- 1. Follow the procedures in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the screws that secure the back cover to the computer.

- **3.** To remove the cover:
 - a. Using a scribe, pry the edges of the back cover from all sides [1].
 - b. Lift the back cover from the computer [2].

Installing the back cover

- 1. Align the back cover with the screw holes on the computer.
- 2. Tighten the screws to secure the base cover to the computer.
- 3. Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>

Removing the battery module

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the <u>back cover</u>.
- **3.** To remove the battery:
 - a. Disconnect the battery cable from the connector on the system board [1].
 - b. Remove the screws that secure the battery to the computer [2].
 - c. Lift and remove the battery from the computer [3].





Installing the battery

- 2. Install the screws that secure the battery to the computer.

Removing the memory module

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.

- **3.** To remove the memory module:
 - a. Pull the retention clips from the memory module until it pops up. [1]
 - b. Remove the memory module from the connector on the system board. [2]



Installing the memory module

- 1. Insert the memory module into the memory module socket.
- 2. Press the memory module until it clicks into place.
- 3. Install the:
 - a. <u>battery</u>
 - b. back cover
- 4. Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>

Removing the WLAN card

- 1. Follow the procedures in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:

- a. back cover
- b. <u>battery</u>
- **3.** To remove the WLAN card:
 - a. Remove the screw that secures the WLAN card to the computer and lift the plastic tab [1] [2].
 - b. Disconnect the antenna cables from the WLAN card [3].
 - c. Remove the WLAN card from the slot on the system board [4].



Installing the WLAN card

- **1.** Insert the WLAN card into the connector at a 45–degree angle.
- 2. Close the plastic cover over the WLAN card.
- 3. Tighten the screw to secure the WLAN card to the computer.
- 4. Connect the antenna cables to the connectors marked on the WLAN card.
- 5. Install the:
 - a. <u>battery</u>
 - b. <u>back cover</u>
- 6. Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>

Removing the touchpad

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. back cover
 - b. <u>battery</u>
 - c. <u>WLAN card</u>
- **3.** To release the touchpad:
 - a. Peel away the adhesive tape [1].
 - b. Disconnect the connector cables from the system board as indicated [2] [3] [4.]



- **4.** To remove the metal bracket above the touchpad:
 - a. Remove the screws that secure the metal bracket to the touchpad. [1]
 - b. Lift the metal bracket away from the touchpad. [2]



- **5.** To remove the touchpad:
 - a. Remove the screws that secure the touchpad to the computer [1].
 - b. Lift and remove the touchpad away from the computer [2].



Installing the touch pad

- 1. Align the touch pad assembly on the computer chassis.
- 2. Install the screws that secure the touch pad assembly.
- 3. Place the metal bracket over the touch pad assembly.
- 4. Install the screws that secure the metal bracket to the touch pad assembly.
- 5. Connect the touch pad cables to the connectors on the computer.
- 6. Affix the adhesive tape over the touch pad assembly.
- 7. Install the:
 - a. <u>WLAN card</u>
 - b. battery
 - c. <u>back cover</u>
- 8. Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>

Removing the coin cell battery

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. <u>back cover</u>
 - b. <u>battery</u>
- **3.** To remove the coin cell battery:

- a. Pry the coin cell battery upwards from its slot using a scribe [1] .
- b. Lift and remove the coin cell battery [2].



Installing the coin cell battery

- **1.** Insert the coin cell battery into the slot on the computer.
- 2. Install the :
 - a. <u>battery</u>
 - b. back cover
- 3. Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>

Removing the Input/Output (I/O) board

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.

- **3.** To remove the I/O board:
 - a. Disconnect the I/O board connector cable from the system board [1] [2] [3].
 - b. Remove the screw that secures the I/O board to the system board [4].
 - c. Lift and remove the I/O board from the computer [5].



Installing the Input/Output (I/O) board

- **1.** Insert the I/O board into the slot on the computer chassis.
- 2. Install the screw that secures the I/O board to the computer.
- 3. Connect the I/O board cables to the system board.
- 4. Install the:
 - a. <u>WLAN card</u>
 - b. <u>battery</u>
 - c. <u>back cover</u>
- 5. Follow the procedure in After working inside your computer

Removing the fan

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. <u>back cover</u>
 - b. <u>battery</u>
 - c. <u>WLAN card</u>
- 3. To remove the fan:
 - a. Disconnect the I/O board and system board cables from the connectors on the system board [1] [2].
 - b. Unroute the WLAN connector cables from the fan module [3].

 - a. Disconnect the fan connector cable from the system board [1].
 - b. Remove the screws that secure the system fan to the system board [2].
 - c. Lift and remove the system fan from the computer [3].



Installing the fan

- **1.** Install the fan into the slot on the system board.
- **2.** Tighten the screws to secure the fan module.
- 3. Connect the I/O board and system fan cable to the system board connectors.
- 4. Install the:
 - a. <u>WLAN card</u>
 - b. <u>battery</u>
 - c. <u>back cover</u>
- 5. Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>

Removing the heatsink

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. <u>back cover</u>

- b. <u>battery</u>
- c. system fan
- **3.** To remove the heatsink:
 - a. Remove the screws that secure the heatsink module to the computer chassis.

NOTE: Loosen the screws in the order of the callout numbers [1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7]. Except for screws [5,6,7] the rest of the screws are retention screws and cannot be fully removed

b. Remove the heatsink module from the slot on the system board [8].



Installing the heatsink

- **1.** Place the heatsink module into its slot on the system board.
- 2. Tighten the screws to secure the heatsink module to the computer.

NOTE: Secure the screws in the order of the callout numbers [1, 2, 3, 4] as seen on the heatsink module. Tighten the rest of the screws.

- 3. Install the:
 - a. system fan
 - b. <u>battery</u>
 - c. back cover
- 4. Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>

Removing the LED board

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:
 - a. <u>back cover</u>
 - b. <u>battery</u>
- **3.** To remove the LED board:
 - a. Lift the tab to disconnect the LED board connector cables from the system board [1].
 - b. Remove the screw that secures LED board to the computer chassis [2].
 - c. Remove the LED board from the computer [3].



Installing the LED board

- 1. Place the LED module into its slot on the computer chassis.
- 2. Tighten the screw to secure the LED module to the computer chassis.
- 3. Connect the LED module cables to the computer chassis.

- 4. Install the:
 - a. <u>battery</u>
 - b. <u>back cover</u>
- 5. Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>

Removing the speakers

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.

- **3.** To remove the speaker cables:
 - a. Disconnect the speaker connector cables from the system board and the LED board. [1] [2].
 - b. Unroute the speaker cable from around the LED board [3].



- **4.** To remove the speakers:
 - a. Unroute the cables along the routing channels.
 - b. Lift and remove the speakers from the computer.



Installing the speakers

- **1.** Insert the speakers into the slot on the computer chassis.
- 2. Route the speaker cable along the routing channel.
- 3. Connect the speaker cables to the connectors on the system board and the LED board.
- 4. Install the:
 - a. <u>battery</u>
 - b. back cover
- 5. Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>

Removing the system board

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.
- 2. Remove the:

3. Lift the tab [1,2,3,4,6] to disconnect the cables [5] from their connectors on the system board.

 - a. Remove the screws that secure the system board to the computer chassis [1].

Installing the system board

Removing the display assembly

1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.



NOTE: If you have purchased the touch version of this computer, you will not be able to further disassemble the display. Instead the entire display assembly needs to be replaced.

- 2. Remove the:
 - a. back cover
 - b. <u>battery</u>
 - c. <u>WLAN card</u>
- **3.** To remove the display hinges:
 - a. Lift the tab to disconnect the display cables from the system board [1].
 - b. Lift the display cable latch [2].
 - c. Unroute the display cable from around the system fan [3] [4].
 - d. Peel away the tape that attaches the display cable to the computer. [5]



4. Flip the computer base around to access the display panel.



- **5.** To remove the display panel:
 - a. Place the computer on a flat surface as indicated.
 - b. Remove the screws that secure the display hinges to the computer chassis. [1]
 - c. Lift to remove the display panel. [2]



Installing the display assembly

- 1. Align the display assembly with the display hinges of the computer chassis.
- 2. Tighten the screws that secure the display hinges.
- 3. Connect the display cables to the connector on the system board.
- **4.** Affix the tape to attach the display cable to the computer.
- 5. Route the display cables along the system fan module on the chassis.

 - a. <u>WLAN card</u>
 - b. <u>battery</u>
 - c. <u>back cover</u>
- 7. Follow the procedure in <u>After working inside your computer</u>

Removing the display bezel

- 1. Follow the procedure in <u>Before working inside your computer</u>.

Technology and components

Power adapter

This laptop is offered with the 45 W power adapter. This adapter uses a USB C connector.

MARNING: When you disconnect the power adapter cable from the laptop, grasp the connector, not the cable itself, and then pull firmly but gently to avoid damaging the cable.

WARNING: The power adapter works with electrical outlets worldwide. However, power connectors and power strips vary among countries. Using an incompatible cable or improperly connecting the cable to the power strip or electrical outlet may cause fire or equipment damage.

Processors

This laptop is shipped with the following processors:

- 7th generation Intel Core i3
- 7th generation Intel Core i5
- 7th generation Intel Core i7

NOTE: The clock speed and performance varies depending on the workload and other variables.

- Run thorough tests to introduce additional test options to provide extra information about the failed device(s)
- · View status messages that inform you if tests are completed successfully
- View error messages that inform you of problems encountered during testing
